Investing in our Neighbourhoods

1.0 Purpose / Summary

- 1.1 The report sets out the current position of the Neighbourhood Investment Fund allocation to this Community Panel as agreed by the Cumberland Council Executive. Where they have been received, this report presents investment applications for consideration and approval from the budget allocation.
- 1.2 This report also presents the South Cumberland Community Panel Neighbourhood Investment Plan for information, discussion and to report progress against it.
- 1.3 The work of the Community Panel contributes to the achievement of the Council Plan 2023 - 2027 vision:
 - Cumberland Council takes a fresh approach to the delivery of inclusive services that are shaped by our residents and communities.
 - By enabling positive outcomes for health and wellbeing, prosperity and the environment we will fulfil the potential of our people and our area.
- 1.4 The Council Plan aims to improve the health and wellbeing of our residents through the following priorities:
 - Addressing inequalities
 - Local economies that work for local people
 - Environmental resilience and the climate emergency
 - Delivering excellent public services
- 1.5 This Community Panel has developed its own local priorities which were shared and discussed with our local communities and agreed formally by this Community Panel. They have been used by the Community Panel to inform the development of the Neighbourhood Investment Plan and in assessing investment applications.

2.0 Recommendations

- 2.1 Members note the contents of the report.
- 2.2 Members to agree an investment (CGA/2116-24) to Bee Unique of £1,748 towards purchasing inflatable play equipment to support activities and events.
- 2.3 Members to agree an investment (CGA/2117-24) to Whicham Parish Council of £10,000 towards the purchase of play park equipment for Silecroft and Kirksanton Play Park sites.
- 2.4 Members agree to an investment (CGA/2125-24) to Lamplugh Village Hall of £6,960 towards resurfacing the village hall car park and creating designated disabled access spaces to improve accessibility.
- 2.5 Members agree to an investment (CGA/2132-24) to Egremont Town Council of £2,425 towards building improvements to Egremont Market Hall.
- 2.6 Members to agree an award of £2,250 from the UKSPF to Age UK to deliver against the E35 Intervention.
- 2.7 Members to agree an award of £8,332 from the UKSPF to Citizens Advice to deliver against the E35 Intervention.
- 2.8 Members to agree an award of £1,250 from the UKSPF to CVS to deliver against the E35 Intervention.
- 2.9 Members to agree an award of £4,990 from the UKSPF to Cumbria Youth Alliance to deliver against the E35 Intervention.

- 2.17 Members to agree an award of £10,000 from the UKSPF to Willow of Millom to deliver against the E35 Intervention.
- 2.18 Members to note an approval made as part of the less than #1,500 arrangement for £483 which has been allocated from the Neighbourhood Investment Fund to Lowside Quarter Parish Council towards the purchasing of litter picking equipment for use at community events.
- 2.19 Members to review the Neighbourhood Investment Plan including discussion about the priorities.

3.0 Background

- 3.1 The Neighbourhood Investment Fund (NIF) budget allocation to this Community Panel is £64,523 as agreed at Full Council on 30 April 2024.
- 3.2 The total amount available to this Panel for the financial year 2024/25 is £64,523.
- 3.3 This allocation is intended to enable the Community Panel to plan activity in their communities through investment that will assist in the achievement of its priorities.
- 3.4 Now that the Community Panel has formally agreed its priorities, the Members will assess applications against the locally agreed priorities which are:
- Improving Health and Wellbeing
 - Accessibility and connectivity
 - Supporting children, families and young people
 - Improving the local living environment
- 3.5 In addition to the priorities, there are a number of criteria that must be adhered to as this relates to public funds. These are set out on the application form. There may be occasion where applications are received that do not fit with the local priorities or meet the funding criteria. In these cases, the applications will not be presented to the Community Panel. However, the Council works with other partners and will often be able to advise on other funding streams or will support a group so that they can meet the funding criteria.
- 3.6 In addition, this Community Panel has considered an additional criterion that they wish to implement:
- Investments up to £1,500 can be agreed outside the meeting in consultation with the full Panel.
- 3.7 Potential applicants are always advised to speak with the relevant Community Development Officer (CDO) prior to submitting an application. The CDO can offer advice and for this panel area. The CDO is Liz Nichol who can be contacted by email (liz.nichol@cumberland.gov.uk).
- 3.8 In addition to the funding described above, the Executive discussed the allocation of the United Kingdom Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) at its meeting on 23 April 2024.
- 3.9 The Portfolio Holder moved that the Priority Intervention E35 (Enrichment & volunteering activities) indicative budget / grant allocations be amended to read:
- £387,520 – allocated to consider targeted approach with public health partners delegated to Community Panels. The Leader seconded the recommendation and the amendment.*
- 3.10 In direct response to this, work has been undertaken to encourage partners to apply who have a track record of delivering projects that are consistent with what this intervention is seeking to achieve. Care has been taken to ensure that areas right across Cumberland can benefit from this funding.
- 3.11 The timeframes for spending this money are tight with all projects funded needing to be completed by 31 January 2025 and full reporting on outcomes by 28 February 2025.

- 3.12 All applications that benefit this community panel area will be presented to the Community Panel for agreement and in this report, they are set out in Section 4 at paragraphs 4.3 to 4.78.
- 3.13 The December meeting of this Community Panel will be too late to fund the majority of projects so any further applications benefiting this Community Panel area will be presented to a Special Meeting if required. Any delays to agreeing applications may mean that projects are no longer viable within the time frames.

4.0 INVESTMENT APPLICATIONS.

- 4.1 Applications in Section 4.3 to 4.33 are made to South Cumberland Community Panel Neighbourhood Investment Fund.
- 4.2 Applications in sections 4.34 to 4.78 are made to the Shared Prosperity Fund delegated to Community Panels. Where applications cover more than one Panel area, assurance has been sought from the applicant that delivery will be across all Panel areas applied to.

APPLICATIONS TO THE NEIGHBOURHOOD INVESTMENT FUND.

Bee Unique – CCGA/2116-24

- 4.3 Bee Unique are applying for £1,748 against total project costs of £7,090. Bee Unique have not previously received funding from Cumberland Council in 2023. Cumberland Council have supported Bee Unique in June 2024 with an Investment from South Cumberland Community Panel of £1600 towards IT equipment and training.
- 4.4 Bee Unique are a charity who formed in 2021 and are run by volunteers who offer a wide range of support and activities to SEN children and their families and carers.
- 4.5 Bee Unique would like to be able to purchase the inflatable play equipment to use at events and fun days and they intend to charge a small fee for children to play on the equipment at events, to generate income which can be used to sustain the delivery of their support services.
- 4.6 Project costs: Bee Unique submitted two lots of quotes for different types of inflatable play equipment. The more expensive items came to £7,090 however we have had to use the lower price quotes (£4,660) to calculate the proportionate 'ask' per Community Panel. This comprises of 37.5% from South Cumberland Community Panel, 50% from Whitehaven and Coastal Community Panel and 12.5% from Lakes to Sea Community Panel for the delivery of activities falling into the Community Panel area.
- 4.7 The organisation has applied for 100% of the project costs from 3 Community Panels.
- 4.8 The Officer recommendation is £1,748 which is 37.5% of the cost of the lower priced equipment.
- 4.9 This application meets with the following panel priorities and key themes:
- Health and wellbeing for all
- Sociable activities for all
 - Sports and physical activities
- Supporting children, families and young people
- Supporting development for new activities

Whicham Parish Council – CCGA/21771-24

- 4.10 Whicham Parish Council are applying for £20,000 against total project costs of £34,971.
- 4.11 Whicham Parish Council have not previously received funding from Cumberland council in 2023.
- 4.12 Whicham Parish Council are responsible for the wellbeing of the local community by delivering services that meet the local needs, representing the local community and striving to improve the quality of life in the parish.
- 4.13 The Parish Council are looking to install additional play equipment suitable for younger children in the Silecroft and at the Kirksanton Play areas. This will enable younger children under 7 years old to have some independent interactive play, improve communication skills and learn social skills as well as physical development in the rural isolated villages close to where they live on sites owned by Whicham Parish Council.
- 4.14 Project expenditure includes a total of £34,971 for outdoor play equipment from the preferred supplier Playdale to compliment some of the existing equipment already on site.
- 4.15 The organisation has applied for £20,000 which is 57% of the project costs. The organisation has raised funds towards this project through fundraising activities. The organisation has applied for a grant of £3,000 although the outcome is not yet known and received a donation of £1,200 from the Blackcombe Fell Runners.
- 4.16 The Officer recommendation is £10,000 which will enable the Parish Council to purchase some additional equipment for both the Silecroft and Kirksanton sites. The Parish Council do receive a precept and the officer considers that funding 50% of the application sum is proportionate to the impact of the funding.
- 4.17 This application meets the following panel priorities and key themes:
- Supporting children, families and young people
 - Supporting development for new activities
 - Improving the local living environment
 - Parks, sports grounds and recreation
 - Accessibility and connectivity
 - Supporting community facilities
 - Health and wellbeing
 - Sports and physical activity

Lamplugh Village Hall – CCGA/2125-24

- 4.18 Lamplugh Village Hall are applying for £22,000 against total project costs of £34,440.
- 4.19 Lamplugh Village Hall have not previously received funding from Cumberland council in 2023.
- 4.20 Lamplugh Village Hall CIO manage the building and the hire for community activities that provide a good range of events and services that improves the quality of life in the village. It also attracts people from the wider area and promotes sustainability of the village hall and the benefits for the surrounding community.
- 4.21 The trustees of Lamplugh Village Hall are seeking to resurface the existing 30 space car park with a more stable tarmac surface as well as provide two designated disabled

parking spaces. This will support the users of the isolated Village Hall as the majority of people attending events travel by car and the disabled space will improve accessibility for those less mobile or using wheeled chairs.

- 4.22 Project expenditure includes a total of £34,440 for resurfacing of the whole car park in tarmac. This includes a quote to provide tarmac surface for two disabled car spaces as an option at a cost of £6,960 including VAT.
- 4.23 The organisation has applied for £22,000 which is 66% of the project costs. The organisation has raised funds towards this project.
- 4.24 The Officer recommendation is £6,960 to enable the Parish Council to provide two designated disabled spaces to improve the accessibility for those users who are less mobile.
- 4.25 This application meets the following panel priorities and key themes:
- Health and wellbeing
- Sociable activities for all
 - Sports and physical activities
- Accessibility and connectivity
- Supporting community facilities

Egremont Town Council CCGA/2132-24

- 4.26 Egremont Town Council are applying for £5,700 against total project costs of £5,700.
- 4.27 Egremont Town Council have not previously received funding from Cumberland council in 2023.
- 4.28 Egremont Town Council are responsible for the wellbeing of the local community by delivering services that meet the local needs, representing the local community and striving to improve the quality of life in the town. Egremont Town Council owns Egremont Market Hall, Egremont Cemetery which is a fully operational cemetery, two allotment sites and the Egremont Bowling Green Pavilion.
- 4.29 The Town Council wish to carry out building work for roof repairs to Egremont Market Hall to ensure that the Market Hall can continue to deliver a whole range of activities in this community venue. This includes regular groups such as Karate, Kettlebells, Farmers Market, Blood Donors plus social events such as Crab Fair, Young Farmers.
- 4.30 Project expenditure includes a total of £5,700 from the preferred supplier although a second quote for the lower sum of £4,850 will be the considered sum for investment.
- 4.31 The organisation has applied for £5,700 which is 100% of the project costs.
- 4.32 The Officer recommendation is £2,425 towards the work to the roof. The Town Council do receive a precept and the officer recommends funding 50% of the lower quote sum of £4850 with the Town Council meeting the additional costs from their own reserves.
- 4.33 This application meets the following panel priorities and key themes:
- Health and wellbeing
- Sociable activities for all
- Accessibility and connectivity
- Supporting community facilities

APPLICATIONS TO THE UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF)

All applications presented are compliant with the intervention E35 as described in the guidance. E35 is to be used to fund activities such as enrichment and volunteering to improve opportunities and promote wellbeing.

Age UK

- 4.34 Age UK are applying for £18,000 in total and are requesting £2,250 from this Community Panel. Given full coverage of Cumberland with this application, applications to the same value will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.
- 4.35 Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.36 Age UK will recruit people over the age of 50 who are out of work for a variety of reasons to be age friendly ambassadors. Those targeted, who are out of work, are likely to be so due to ill health and this project will support them with varying skills to get back into employment, but will also address social isolation, increase their resilience and have a positive impact on their mental health.
- 4.37 They are looking to achieve a minimum of forty volunteering rolls across Cumberland.
- 4.38 The officer recommendation is £2,250 from this Community Panel.

Citizens Advice (Carlisle and Eden, Allerdale and Copeland)

- 4.39 Citizens Advice are applying for £50,000 in total as a joint application and the project will be delivered together to reduce administration and training costs and to provide resilience across the project. They are requesting £8,332 from this Community Panel. Given full coverage of Cumberland with this application, applications will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.
- 4.40 Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.41 Citizens Advice will utilise the funding to secure additional training supervisor hours to support a new cohort of volunteers. They will target potential volunteers who may not have worked for many years, have given up work due to illness or have long term health conditions. They will offer a wider range of volunteering opportunities including reception duties and administration tasks, service promotion, research and campaigns to develop into the more traditional information and advice rolls.
- 4.42 The officer recommendation is £8,332 from this Community Panel.

Cumbria CVS

- 4.43 Cumbria CVS are applying for £10,000 in total and are requesting £1,250 from this Community Panel. Applications of the same value will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.
- 4.44 This is towards a project valued at £20,000 and funding of £10,000 has already been achieved. Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.45 Cumbria CVS will develop and provide a package of support to those participants not currently in the labour market across Cumberland. This will include workshops, support

and social action days in a bid to improve individuals confidence and social skills and reduce social isolation.

4.46 The officer recommendation is £1,250 from this Community Panel.

Cumbria Youth Alliance

4.47 Cumbria Youth Alliance are applying for £39,950 in total and are requesting £4,990 from this Community Panel. Applications of the same value will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.

4.48 Cumbria Youth Alliance will reengage up to 30 young people in work focused activities, confidence building sessions, education and training. These will equip young people with the skills, resources and support needed for the transition into employment or further education.

4.49 The officer recommendation is £4,990 from this Community Panel.

Home to Work

4.50 Home to Work are applying for £16,000 in total and are requesting the full amount from this Community Panel.

4.51 Home to Work will use the funding to enhance an existing facility that is used to develop self confidence and reduce anxiety for those looking to get back in to work. In addition they will utilise the funding to develop an existing pilot handyman scheme that predominately supports the third sector.

4.52 The officer recommendation is £16,000 from this Community Panel.

NADT Pitstop Project

4.53 NADT are applying for £37,960 in total for this project and £4,745 from this Community Panel. Given full coverage of Cumberland with this application, applications to the same value will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.

4.54 Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.

4.55 NADT will deliver a previously piloted Pitstop programme which is designed for young people aged up to 25 who experience personal, emotional, social or educational barriers. The scheme runs from Cumbria's first large scale studio based film production company in Carlisle but is available to young people across Cumberland to help overcome transport as a barrier.

4.56 The officer recommendation is £4,745 from this Community Panel.

Rosehill Youth Theatre and the Solway Hall

4.57 Rosehill Youth Theatre are applying for £9,000 in total and are requesting £1500 from this Community Panel. Applications will also be presented to Workington Together and Whitehaven & Coastal

4.58 This is towards a project valued at £19,440 and funding of £10,000 has already been achieved. Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.

- 4.59 Rosehill Youth Theatre will recruit an additional 7 volunteers who are neurodiverse with a view to participants moving into further education, employment or volunteering opportunities.
- 4.60 The officer recommendation is £1500 from this Community Panel.

Time to Change

- 4.61 Time to Change are applying for £15,000 in total and are requesting £7,500 from this Community Panel. An application will also be presented to Whitehaven and Coastal.
- 4.62 This is towards a project valued at £25,000 and funding of £10,000 has already been achieved. Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.63 Time to Change will train volunteers in barista and customer service in the existing coffee bar so they are trained to seek employment in the hospitality sector. This organisation will focus on providing opportunities for ex residents of Calderwood House and will work in partnership with Phoenix Enterprise Centre to identify vulnerable participants who would benefit from this scheme.
- 4.64 The officer recommendation is £7,500 from this Community Panel.

Together We

- 4.65 Together We are applying for £3,286 in total and are requesting £543 from this Community Panel. Applications will also be presented to Workington Together and Whitehaven and Coastal.
- 4.66 This is towards a project valued at £19,786 and funding of £16,500 has already been achieved. Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.67 Together We will employ a support worker to support specific groups of adults to engage on wellbeing activities and volunteering opportunities to help overcome barriers to gain employment. They will support 10 adults for up to 24 sessions each.
- 4.68 The officer recommendation is £543 from this Community Panel.

Triple A Project (All About Autism)

- 4.69 Triple A are applying for £1,569 in total and are requesting £196 from this Community Panel. Applications of the same value will also be presented to the other seven Community Panels.
- 4.70 This is towards a project valued at £11,420 and funding of £9,851 has already been achieved. Although this project is scalable, greater benefits will be achieved through the full scale delivery of the project.
- 4.71 Triple A will provide accessible, expert advice and support to people with autism to find volunteer and employment opportunities. The funding will be used to pay for specialist mentors who will support individuals.
- 4.72 The officer recommendation is £196 from this Community Panel.

Whamos

- 4.73 Whamos are applying for £10,000 in total and are requesting the full amount from this Community Panel.
- 4.74 Whamos will launch a targeted programme to provide work placement opportunities which will transition participants from unemployment to meaningful employment by equipping them with essential work based skills and tools. The programme will offer hands on experience and training.
- 4.75 The officer recommendation is £10,000 from this Community Panel.

Willow of Millom

- 4.76 Willow of Millom are applying for £10,000 in total and are requesting the full amount from this Community Panel.
- 4.77 Willow of Millom will establish a monthly pop up diversity café that employs and provides training to people with disabilities in preparation to open a permanent café providing the same opportunities.
- 4.78 The officer recommendation is £10,000 from this Community Panel.

Investments to note as they have already been approved

- 4.79 CCGA/2122-24 Lowside Quarter Parish Council awarded the sum of £483 allocated from the Neighbourhood Investment Fund to purchase litter picking equipment for use at community events.
- 4.80 This project meets the following panel priority:
- Improving the local living environment
 - Promoting pride in your local area and improving safety

5.0 Other investment into the panel area

Borderlands

- 5.1 Cllr Sam Pollen the Member for Egremont and members of Wigton and Longtown team attended a Borderlands Place Programme Conference at Gretna on 30 July.
- 5.2 Penrith and Stranraer Town Teams gave presentations on the progress they have made on their Place Plans and projects. There was also an opportunity for Town Team members to network with each other.
- 5.3 A similar event which will be held in Wigton is being organised in November for Town Team members from Egremont Longtown and Wigton.

Environment

- 5.4 Fibrus Broadband involved with the Hyperfast GB connecting Cumbria programme have been working in partnership with the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to deliver Pollinator schemes as part of the Get Cumbria Buzzing, not Buffering Project.

- 5.5 In conjunction with Cumberland Council Parks and Open Spaces Team, restoration work is planned for the Winder Road verges that are South of Skelsceugh Road with planting of plug plants due to commence in September.
- 5.6 Local groups and the community will be encouraged to participate in planting activities which will be advertised in advance.

Transport - Bus Service Improvement Plan

- 5.7 £2.4 Million in funding from the Department of Transport under the Bus Service Improvement Plan has brought improvements to Cumberland Bus Service.
- 5.8 The first phase of the Bus Service Improvement Plan is a result of collaboration with local Members, bus operators and stakeholders to revamp and expand our bus service.
- 5.9 Partnering with Stagecoach we are set to deliver a more reliable and accessible network that connects communities.
- 5.10 Starting this Autumn the following bus enhancements in our panel area include:
- Route 30 – Egremont/Frizington – Maryport, Sunday Service will run every 30 Minutes
 - Route M1 – Millom Town Service including Haverigg
Strengthening community connections
 - Route 22 – Cleator Moor – Cleator – Whitehaven Hospital
Focus on accommodating passengers with mobility needs
- 5.11 Work with Lamplugh, Arlecdon & Frizington and Dean Parish Councils has allowed the Route 217 from Frizington – Lamplugh – Dean -Cockermouth to be extended until March 2025

6.0 Neighbourhood Investment Plan

- 6.1 Since the last meeting, the following progress has been made (**appendix 1**):
- Neighbourhood Investment Fund budget allocation for 2024/25
 - Digital Inclusion - The CDO is now part of the new Digital Inclusion Group with organisations Ability Net and Digital Unite to investigate how they and Community Panel could work together to improve digital access.
 - Environment - Discussion with Countryside Access Officers and Members on improvements and knowledge of public rights of way and potential further network engagement
 - Playpark reviews with Cumberland Council Parks and Open spaces team
 - Public Participation scheme proposed.

7.0 Options

Alternative Options Considered

- 7.1 Members may review and evaluate the recommendations. Members may choose to approve, vary, defer, or reject the recommendations.

Risks

- 7.2 The risk associated with this report is that allocations proposed do not meet the criteria for investments. This is mitigated through officer experience, processes in place and awarding investments in a public forum.

Consultation

- 7.3 There has been no consultation associated with this report.

Legal Comment

- 7.4 Legal Comment No legal issues arise directly from the report. Any legal issues arising from the delivery of specific projects will be dealt with as they arise.

Finance Comment

- 7.5 The Neighbourhood Investment Fund is part of Communities and Localities within the Public Health and Communities Directorate.
- 7.6 The Neighbourhood Investment Fund budget for 2024/25 is £0.727m which is allocated to fund the 8 Community Panels.
- 7.7 The 2024/25 budget allocation to the South Cumberland Community Panel is £64,523.
- 7.8 Approval is sought to agree a proposed funding allocation of £21,133. This is in addition to £17,378 already agreed.
- 7.9 It is recommended that the funding allocation is approved as it is within the confines of the available remaining 2024/25 budget as shown in the table below:
